40th Anniversary Organization History Edition

The mission of Companion Animal Association of AZ., Inc. (CAAA) is to enhance the quality of life for people by promoting the Human/Companion Animal Bond. Today, CAAA maintains a network of community volunteers and works cooperatively with several organizations and individuals with similar objectives.

The establishment of CAAA was the result of several early initiatives driven by Juana Lyon and other key individuals.

In 1981, the first International Conference on the Human/Companion Animal Bond was held in Philadelphia. The result of this conference led to legislation being passed in Congress enabling the elderly of federally assisted housing projects to keep their pets.

In 1982, a Task Force on Companion Animals for the Elderly was established in Arizona. With the co-sponsorship of 30 federal, state, and local agencies and organizations in the fields of aging, behavioral health, education, veterinary medicine, housing, social services, and the humane interests, the first Arizona conference on Companion Animals for the Elderly was created.

In 1983, community interest established at the conference led to incorporation (501(c) (3)) of the Task Force, as the Companion Animal Association of Arizona.

Since then, CAAA has continued to grow and expand its outreach in support of the human/companion animal bond. CAAA and its programs have thrived over the past 40 years because of the commitment and caring of its volunteers and supporters.

PET THERAPY PROGRAM PAST AND PRESENT:

CAAA's most visible program, with hundreds of volunteers over the years, provides pet therapy teams throughout the valley. In the early years, our visiting program included the AZ State Hospital, the YWCA Shelter for Abused Women and Children, and the Phoenix Shanti Living Center, an HIV/Aids treatment and hospice facility. Now, our pet therapy visiting program is centered on elder care residential facilities.

A volunteer wishing to enter our program must complete a personal profile and be interviewed by a member of CAAA. The animal, or animals, belonging to the volunteer must pass a health and temperament screening by their veterinarian. The prospective volunteer then accompanies one of our experienced volunteers as an observer during one of our care center visits. If upon completion of the observer visit, the volunteer wants to continue they are observed while making a visit with their pet. Corrections and suggestions are made by the CAAA observer and the new volunteer is ready to be scheduled for solo visits.

Our visits to the facilities are scheduled in advance on a regular schedule for the convenience of volunteers and facilities. We consider each visit a team effort with the

CAAA volunteer responsible for having their pet well groomed, in good health, and well mannered during the visit. If the facility requires an Activities Director to accompany the visit, this staff member should know the patients, their desire for a pet visit, their temperament that day, and if there are any medical problems to be considered. A good escort can make the visit more pleasant for everyone and help us to take full advantage of the time allotted.

MARGIE MILLER HELPING HAND FUND PAST AND PRESENT:

Named in memory of a member of the original task force, and past Secretary and Treasurer of CAAA, donations (unless otherwise designated) are put in this special fund to help the low-income elderly and disabled with their pet related problems. CAAA has partnered with veterinarians who will administer assistance to the pet once the pet owner has been screened by a CAAA representative.

Neither the veterinarian nor CAAA can underwrite long-term illness, nor can this be applied to the owner of many pets. This is a one-time assistance per family which can include end of life care.

Calls seeking help are referred to the chairperson for screening, and when appropriate, necessary arrangements with a participating veterinarian are made.

PET GRIEF SUPPORT SERVICE PAST AND PRESENT:

For many years, CAAA's Pet Grief Support Service provided understanding, compassion and support to anyone anticipating or coping with the loss of a beloved companion animal. Staffed and operated entirely by trained volunteers, the Service offered a 24-hour a day telephone helpline, in-person support group meetings, information and reading lists on pet loss, and referral to appropriate resources. Ongoing consultation was provided by a dedicated veterinarian and a professional grief counselor who specialized in pet loss and bereavement. As support for pet loss became more widely available via telephone and the Internet, in 2012 sponsorship of the service was officially transferred to Hospice of the Valley, which proudly includes support for pet loss as part of its Bereavement Services.

RETIRED CAAA PROGRAMS:

COMPANION ANIMALS IN HOUSING

In the early days, this committee received and evaluated phone inquiries regarding the concerns of low-income elderly and disabled tenants of HUD (Housing and Urban Development) housing relating to their keeping pets, landlord requirements, and the application of legislation passed in 1983. This program attempted to ensure compliance of local and federal laws.

ASSISTANCE DOG TRAINING PROGRAM

Also, in the early days of CAAA, we had an Assistance Dog Training Program to train the dogs of disabled persons to assist them in their every day life. As time progressed and other programs focused directly on this issue, we eliminated this program.

OTHER AREAS OF CAAA ASSISTANCE

In the early years, CAAA provided pet food assistance to those in need, as our volunteers would personally deliver pet food to their homes. We also directed inquiries for animals to adopt to area programs, such as the Arizona Humane Society.


STEP #1 - EXPLAIN THE MODERN ART CREATIVE PROCESS BY APRIL CROW

STEP #4 - TADA!!... MODERN ART ARTISTS AT WORK!







Therapy Animals Are Also Recognized in Other Countries

On the second floor of the Sakura Village in Yamashina Japan, residents can live together with dogs and cats. While some residents move in with their pets, others merely wish to live together with the cats and dogs that are not their own.

Bunpuku is one of the main therapy animals at Sakura Village. He is known as "The End-of-Life Care Dog". He has the unique ability to know when residents are approaching the end of life, and he stays by their side during their final hours.

Of the four units on the floor, two units are home to 10 dogs, and two units to nine cats. Most of these pets arrived together with their owners, but a handful were rescued by animal welfare groups.
